Welcome to the 2024-2025 school year! We are thrilled to embark on this exciting journey with you and your children. As we step into September, we look forward to seeing the bright, smiling faces of our little ones and families. Our GCDC Parent Advisory Committee (PAC) is eager to support and engage with you throughout the year. Together, we will create and share in this dynamic learning experience. Let's make this school year memorable and full of growth. Thank you for your continued support and involvement. Here's to a fantastic year ahead!

HOMEWORK

Teachers in the Milky Way, Shooting Stars, and Constellations are required to assign homework each Friday. Other classrooms may assign homework as well. This homework will be a developmentally appropriate activity that:

Helps to practice or expand concepts taught in class.

- Allows parents to become involved and better understand how well your child understands the given concept.
- Gets children in the habit of doing homework and turning it in on time.

We ask that you support your child in doing their homework and turning it in on time. We also recommend that you keep the following supplies on hand to support homework throughout the school year:

- Child-sized, blunt scissors
- Crayons (8 count primary colors, the fat ones)
- Primary Pencil (the fat one)
- Primary paper
- Glue
- Pencil box for storage of supplies



It's always a good idea to help children to form good habits at an early age. With that in mind, we suggest that you keep the supplies in a consistent place, have children do homework at the same time and place each day and you become engaged.

Homework assignments should not take more than 15-20 minutes each night. If it takes longer, you should stop and pick up the next day. If you do this throughout this school year, our children will advance at a greater rate and develop good habits that will serve them well throughout the rest of their school years.

Remember, you are your child's first teacher!

GCDC Volunteer Policy

Beginning in the 2024-2025 school year, parents must provide a minimum of ten hours of volunteer work, per family, per school year (September - August). 4 hours must be completed by December 20th. 4 hours must be completed by June 27th and 2 hours must be completed by August 22nd. In addition to volunteering in the classroom, parents may volunteer in other ways in support of the program.

Volunteer Receipt: No matter the type of volunteer work performed; parents are asked to complete a volunteer receipt each time volunteer services are performed at GCDC. Blank receipts are located in the front office. We ask that you do this even after you have met your ten-hour commitment. Completed and signed receipts should be placed in the box outside the front office.

Questions About Volunteer Work: As volunteer opportunities present themselves in the classrooms, common areas and throughout GCDC, they are posted on our volunteer recruitment site, in the lunchbox press and in weekly communication with teachers.



Two snacks are provided daily. A morning snack is served between 9:00 a.m.-9:30 a.m. An afternoon snack is served between 3:00 p.m.-3:30 p.m. These snacks are nutritious and varied. Monthly snack menus are emailed out and updated at www.gcdcnasa.org. Additionally, the snack menus can be found on the Parent Board at the front door.

Each child should bring his or her lunch daily, carried in a lunch box or bag. Each item must be marked with the child's first and last name and the date. Lunch boxes/bags may not be placed in the refrigerator. GCDC has a warmer and a refrigerator to store children's food until lunch is served. The center provides milk for lunch; therefore, a beverage is not required. Each lunch must meet the GCDC meal pattern requirements. Please do not include junk food in your child's lunch. We also ask that parents do not send food to school in fast food containers. It is our experience that when these foods are served, it is distracting to the other children. Further, fast foods typically do not meet our nutritional requirements.

Per our licensing requirements and NAEYC accreditation standards, it is essential that we always maintain compliance with the Child and Adult Food Program (CACP) requirements. When a child's lunch does not meet the CACFP requirements, the GCDC Food Service Manager will supplement the lunch. Because this can become a major expense for GCDC, a

note will be placed in the child's lunchbox notifying them of noncompliance issue and charge the account \$10.00 for each missing component.

Below please find a guide that displays what meal components children must be served daily at lunch.

Fluid Milk – Which GCDC will always offer -- 6 fluid oz for preschoolers (AM Snack & Lunch) **Meat/meat alternative** - 1 ½ ounces for preschoolers

ONE vegetable AND ONE fruit choice 1/8 cup for toddlers and ¼ cup for preschoolers OR TWO vegetables must be two different choices (no fruit) ¼ cup for toddlers and ½ cup for preschoolers.

Whole Grain - 1/2 slice for both toddlers and preschoolers (pasta, biscuit, roll etc.)

Reminder from the Business Manger

As we embark upon a new school year, we want to inform our new parents and remind our current parents of some GCDC policies.

- ★ All parents must clock their child in/out daily using the GCDC ProCare Engage App. All parents must download ProCare Engage to their cell phone. When families are within .25 of a mile to GCDC they will be able to clock in/out.
- ★ GCDC hours are 7:15 a.m. 5:30 p.m. Parents who pick up their child(ren) after 5:30 p.m. will be charged a late pick-up fee.
- ★ Discussions with teachers are encouraged, however, they should be no longer than 2-3 minutes at drop off/pickup as teachers are still working in a ratio status. If a longer, deeper discussion is necessary please schedule a time to meet with your child's teacher that is convenient for you both. Please be conscientious and respectful of your teachers' time.
- ★ Accounts are billed Wednesday of each week.

 Payments are direct debited from your account on file by close of business each Wednesday. Declined payments will be assessed an overdue payment fee.
- ★ Many families participate in flexible spending accounts. Parents are encouraged to log into their ProCare Account to view and download account statements as needed. Accounts can be accessed here. www.myprocare.com

DAILY SCHEDULE

Each class at GCDC begins its day with a morning meeting or circle time. This is one of the few times that teachers engage in large group teacher directed instruction. During this time, teachers build schema for the rest of the day by introducing concepts, tell children what their goals for each center during play and review basic concepts such as letters, numbers, letter sounds, vocabulary, weather, calendar and much more. A lot happens in this short period of time! Teachers then build upon this introductory lesson throughout the day.

We have found that children who are regularly present for morning meeting or circle time often do far better on assessments. When children routinely arrive later in the day, they often miss important concepts. While our teachers work with the students to help them catch up, its simply not the same as participating in a dynamic morning meeting or circle time with their peers.

It's important to also remember that when children's schedules are disrupted and are allowed to sleep in late and then come to school, they are often more irritable.

throughout the day because it's difficult for them to get back on schedule with the rest of the class. This again, results in hem not being ready to learn.

One thing that parents can do to ensure that their children get the most out of this school year is to have their children here by 9:30 a.m. each day. This ensures a less disruptive day for our teachers, better learning opportunities for your child and better preparation for a traditional school day.




HAND WASHING POLICY

Young children worried about starting preschool or



Did you know that prolonged goodbyes can make it difficult for your child to transition each day? Here are some tips for making your goodbyes a little less traumatic each

- ★ Follow the same routine each day. Walk your child to the refrigerator to put away lunch, into the classroom to put away personal items and then into the opening classroom. Talk to your child throughout this time about what might be happening in class that day or the time you'll be back pick them up. Speak about time in terms they understand. The easiest way to do this is to reference to their day. For example, "I'll be back after p.m. snack."
- ★ Allow your child to "push you out the door." Once inside the opening classroom, allow your child to gently push you out of the door. This gives your child some control.
- Just kiss and say goodbye. Do this once and leave. Do not prolong the goodbye. You can always call back to check on your child later.

It is our experience that children settle in rather quickly after their parents leave. The routine of the day, comfort of teachers and caring friends make this possible at GCDC. If we find your child is not transitioning in a developmentally appropriate ways, we will confer with you about possible solutions.

Just remember, we have a vested interest in a happy and smooth transition for your child. We will work with you to ensure that this happens.
